WINNEBAGO COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS May 29, 2018

The Winnebago County Board of Supervisors met in session at 9:00 A.M. May 29, 2018 adjourned from May 22, 2018.

Present: Supervisors Durby, Jensvold, and Stensrud

Absent: On a motion by Durby and seconded by Jensvold the Supervisors moved to approve the minutes for the May 22, 2018 Board Meeting and approve the agenda for May 29, 2018. All voted aye. Motion carried.

On a motion by Jensvold and seconded by Durby the Supervisors moved to open the Public Hearing for DD 3-11 Lat 5 and Lat 7. All voted aye. Motion carried.

On a motion by Durby and seconded by Jensvold the Supervisors moved to approve the Utility Accommodation Permit for overhead to underground conversion by Alliant Energy in Rake. All voted aye. Motion carried.

On a motion by Jensvold and seconded by Durby the Supervisors moved to approve the Utility Accommodation Permit for electric service by Heartland Power in Grant Township, Section 8. All voted aye. Motion carried.

Bruce Helgeson discussed NIRHA and the 28E agreement. This will be on the agenda for a decision on June 19, 2018.

On a motion by Durby and seconded by Jensvold the Supervisors moved to table the discussion regarding the 3rd payment to County Social Services. All voted aye. Motion carried.

On a motion by Durby and seconded by Jensvold the Supervisors moved to approve the payroll claims. All voted aye. Motion carried.

City of Lakota Unapproved Minutes Regular Council Meeting June 4, 2018, 7:00 p.m.

Mayor Heidecker called the meeting to order at 7:02 p.m. Council members present were: Hagedorn, Janssen, Kitzinger, Meyer and Steven. City staff present were: Pam Robb, Sue Kearney and Jim Lentz.

Steven moved, Janssen seconded to approve the agenda. All approved, motion carried.

Janssen moved, Steven seconded to approve the 5/7/18 minutes. All approved, motion carried.

Hagedorn moved, Steven seconded to approve the payment of bills presented and bank statements. All approved, motion carried.

Mayor Heidecker opened the public hearing to Review an application for a State Revolving Fund loan and to make available to the public the contents of an environmental information document and the project plan design related to the City's Water Treatment Plant and public water supply system.

Public Forum-Lakota resident Janet Chambers was present.

The following reports were given - Mayor Heidecker was approached by an interested party about mowing the lagoon pasture. This will be put out for bids. City Clerk-Pam Robb provided council with city financial reports and bank statements. City Hall was contacted by Annette Valvick asking if an advertising sign could be put out by Highway 9 for Tonic Sol-fa event June 8th at St. Paul Lutheran Church. Council members unanimously approved this request. Steven moved, Janssen seconded to replace fluorescent lights in community center with energy efficient LED at a cost of \$437.94. All approved, motion carried.

Old Business: Sanitation Business Plan-Royce Janssen has been working with the City's bonding attorney to structure a loan to purchase Anderson Sanitation. Bonding attorney said the City does not have the authority to own a business that's revenue outside the City is higher than what is within the City. The City is negotiating with Gary Anderson during this transition process.

Council members discussed amending City's Animal Ordinance No. 98 to include yearly licensing fee. Council members discussed Trees on P60 and reviewed correspondence from County Engineer.

Deb Steven shared that 92 people were served at the Memorial Day Program and there were plenty of bars and servers. City received a thank you card from Memorial Day Committee.

Mayor Heidecker closed the Public Hearing

New Business: Steven moved, Meyer seconded to approve Iowa State Revolving Fund Environmental Information Document. All approved, motion carried.

Janssen moved, Hagedorn seconded to approve Resolution 2018-06-04, A Resolution Authorizing the City Clerk to Certify to the County Treasurer for Collection on the Unpaid Charges from Utilities and Communications. Roll call vote-Hagedorn-aye, Janssen-aye, Kitzinger-aye, Meyer-aye, Steven-aye. Resolution 2018-06-04 carried.

Kitzinger moved, Janssen seconded to approve the transfer of RoadRunner's

liquor license to Eagle Center on August 18th and August 25th for Weddings and granted permission to block off street north of bar for possible car show and outside entertainment August 11th. All approved, motion carried.

Kitzinger moved, Meyer seconded to approve the sponsorship of Lakota children entering grades K-12 to swim at the Buffalo Center swimming pool. All approved, motion carried.

Council members discussed amending Junk & Junk Vehicle Ordinance to include children's toys. Clerk will reach out to other cities for examples.

Hagedorn moved, Janssen seconded to adjourn meeting at 8:16 pm. All approved, motion carried.

2018 WATER QUALITY REPORT FOR THOMPSON WATER WORKS This report contains important information regarding the water quality in our water system. The source of our water is groundwater. Our water quality testing shows the following results:

DEFINITIONS

- Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) - The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.
Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG) - The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs are allowed for a margin of safety.

required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

- Action Level (AL) - The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.
Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal (MRDLG) - The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.
Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL) - The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water posed a health risk. Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. THOMPSON WATER WORKS is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. SOURCE WATER ASSESSMENT INFORMATION

This water supply obtains its water from the sandstone of the Dakota aquifer. The Dakota aquifer was determined to have low susceptibility to contamination because the characteristics of the aquifer and overlying materials provide natural protection from contaminants at the land surface. The Dakota wells will have low susceptibility to surface contaminants such as leaking underground storage tanks, contaminant spills, and excess fertilizer application.
